## SPOTLIGHT ON PEACE AND SECURITY INTERVENTIONS BY KENYAN YSOS:

#### 1. Endeleza Youth Initiative.

Endeleza Youth Initiative is dedicated to empowering young people through mentorship, education, and community driven programs that foster peace and holistic development. One of their flagship initiatives, the 'Peace Starts With Us' Campaign, is a youth-led movement active in Kisumu, Nairobi, and Mombasa.

The campaign incorporates:

- School mentorship forums focused on conflict resolution and peaceful co-existence.
- Inter-community dialogue sessions that bring together youth from diverse ethnic and social backgrounds.
- Leadership workshops that nurture civic responsibility and local peacebuilding efforts.

Through this campaign, Endeleza is cultivating a generation of peace champions across urban and peri-urban settings.



#### 2. Timiza Youth Initiative



Operating under the theme "Innovating Public Safety Initiatives for Sustainable Development", Timiza Youth Initiative has been running the Public Safety Initiative across Kilifi North Sub-County for the past six months. This community-led intervention aims to reduce crime, radicalization, and social unrest by:

- •Strengthening trust between citizens and law enforcement agencies.
- •Providing peace education and digital literacy training.
- •Facilitating economic empowerment activities for youth at risk.

The initiative is transforming Kilifi's most vulnerable communities into safer, more resilient spaces, while simultaneously promoting youth leadership and agency.

#### 3. Medical Students for Social Responsibility – Kenya Methodist University Chapter (MSSR-KEMU)

MSSR-KEMU is a youth-led organization for medical students and physicians advocating for nuclear disarmament and peaceful health practices. Affiliated with the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War (IPPNW), the Chapter has been implementing the Medical Peacework Courses Project in Meru County.

Over the past month, 14 youth and university students completed the online course and were certified as Medical Peacework Trainers. Next month, 20 more healthcare students are scheduled to begin training under their guidance.

MSSR-KEMU is also preparing to host its 2nd Annual General Meeting and Awarding Ceremony in Meru, an open and inclusive event that welcomes all interested stakeholders.







#### 4. Sambasports Youth Agenda

At Sambasports Youth Agenda, sport is more than recreation; it is a catalyst for peace and social cohesion. Their flagship initiative, Soccer 4 Peace, leverages local football tournaments as dynamic platforms for community dialogue, mutual understanding, and collective action. Key components include:

- Engagements with local security actors.
- Team-based conversations on peace and respect.
- Peacebuilding presentations integrated into match-day programs.

By combining the power of sport with intentional dialogue, Sambasports is nurturing values of unity, love, and respect among players and spectators alike.
